### **EUROPEAN UNION**

#### Shaping the Conference on the Future of Europe

The European Commission set out its ideas for shaping the *Conference on the Future of Europe*, which should be launched on Europe Day, 9 May 2020 and run for two years. The Communication adopted is the Commission's contribution to the already lively debate around the Conference on the Future of Europe – a project announced by President Ursula von der Leyen in her <u>Political Guidelines</u>, to give Europeans a greater say on what the European Union does and how it works for them. The Conference will build on past experiences, such as citizens' dialogues, while introducing a wide range of new elements to increase outreach and strengthen ways for people to shape future EU action. ### 2020 EU budget: Tackling climate change and delivering on other EU priorities

The three EU institutions agreed on and approved the EU's budget for 2020. This will allow the EU to focus its resources on the priorities that matter to citizens: climate change, jobs, young people, security and solidarity in the EU. The 2020 EU budget will also prepare the transition to the next budgetary cycle as it will be the seventh and last one under the current 2014-2020 long-term budgetary cycle. The budget is set at  $\leq$ 168.69 billion in commitments (money that can be agreed in contracts in a given year) and  $\leq$ 153.57 billion in payment credits (money that will be paid out). Some key features include:

- 21% of the overall budget will go to measures to address climate change. For example, the LIFE Programme for the Environment and Climate Change will receive €589.6 million (+5.6% compared to 2019). Horizon 2020, which traditionally makes a substantial contribution to reaching climate targets, will get €13.49\* billion (+8.8% compared to 2019).
- Close to half of the funds €83.93 billion in commitments (+4.1% compared to 2019) will help making our economy more competitive. Of them, €58.65 billion (+2.5% compared to 2019) will go to narrowing economic gaps in and between Member States, boosting growth, job creation and fostering convergence via the European Structural and Investment Funds (ESI Funds).
- The European global satellite navigation system Galileo will be supported with €1.2 billion (+74.7% compared to 2019) to expand its worldwide market uptake to reach 1.2 billion users by the end of 2020.
- €255 million will provide incentives for European companies to work together to develop defence products and technology under the European Defence Industrial Development Programme.
- Young people will benefit through a number of programmes: €2.89 billion will go to education through <u>Erasmus+</u> (+3.6% compared to 2019). The <u>European Solidarity Corps</u> will create opportunities to volunteer or work in projects at home or abroad with €166.1 million (+15.9% compared to 2019).
- European farmers will benefit from €58.12 billion.

• Security and migration management will continue to receive support. For example, €2.36 billion will go to the Asylum, Migration and Integration Fund, the Internal Security Fund, and the agencies that work in this field (Europol, the European Border and Coast Guard Agency (Frontex), EASO, eu-LISA).

### **EU Parliament elected the von der Leyen Commission**

On 1st December 2019, a new European Commission, led by President Ursula von der Leyen, took office. After the approval of <u>the college of Commissioners</u> by the European Parliament (see President von der Leyen's speech, available in <u>EN</u>, <u>FR</u> and <u>DE</u>), the new European executive team started work in December 2019.

During her opening statement, European Commission President von der Leyen highlighted that appropriate investment and regulatory frameworks will be put into place for Europe to lead the way internationally on a range of critical issues: environmental protection and climate change, growth, inclusion, innovation and digitalisation, as well as the protection of democracy, European values, citizens' rights and the rule of law. President Ursula von der Leyen also announced that the word 'culture' will after all figure in the portfolio title of EU Commissioner Mariya Gabriel from Bulgaria. Gabriel's portfolio, initially entitled 'Commissioner for Innovation and Youth', has been renamed as 'EU Commissioner for Innovation, Research, Culture, Education and Youth'. During her speech, Ursula von der Leyen recalled that "culture and education are what link our history with our future. This is what makes us unique. Our soul, our culture, our diversity, our heritage". More information here.

# Prospective cuts to Erasmus+ and Creative Europe in EU long-term budget deeply worrying

Ahead of talks among EU leaders on the long-term budget in the European Council 12-13 December, the Chair of Culture and Education Committee, Sabine Verheyen (EPP, DE), issued a statement in which she expressed her concern that "the Finnish Presidency proposal for European Council discussions on the next EU long-term budget is really wide of the mark". Verheyen added that "Although, so far, we have no figures for any of the education, culture and youth programmes, we have been crunching the numbers and the picture is bleak. As things stand, based on equal across-the-board cuts for those programmes where no figure is included, we're looking at 20% cuts for all three programmes compared to the Commission proposal, 48% for Erasmus+ compared to the Parliament proposal and 53% for Creative Europe compared to the Parliament position. This is deeply worrying." In its negotiating mandate on Erasmus+, the EU Parliament called for the budget for the next EU long-term budget to be tripled. Read the full press release here.

### Education, Youth, Culture and Sports Council meeting 21-22 November 2019

The members of the Education, Youth, Culture and Sports Council discussed various issues, including the adoption of a Resolution on the cultural dimension of sustainable development, which objective is to strengthen culture's contribution to sustainable development by starting a process that will lead to an action plan on the cultural dimension of sustainable development at EU level. The action plan should ensure coherence among cultural and culture-related measures and approaches at the EU level and it would complement the work of Member States in this regard. The Council also had a debate on the strengths, innovation potential and global competitiveness of the European cultural, creative and audio-visual industries (CCIs), based on a discussion paper by the Council Presidency.

### OMC Group on Culture and Social Cohesion meeting on 17 December 2019

The Open Method of Coordination (OMC) group of Member States' experts on Culture and Social Cohesion (set up under Work Plan for Culture 2019-2022) will build on the work and

recommendations by its predecessor group, especially regarding the place-centred approach. The group shall explore further questions on the contribution of culture and the arts to social and territorial cohesion, while more specifically addressing issues such as segregation, demographic challenges, geographical disparities in health and well-being and access to culture, as well as the need for inclusive public spaces for exchanges with other people and civic engagement. #### Creative Europe Programme (2021-2027)

Having considered the possibility of merging the Creative Europe programme with other programmes supporting European values, rights and justice, the European Commission has decided to continue the Creative Europe programme as a stand-alone programme, increasing its budget by 17 %. The only programme focusing exclusively on cultural and creative activities and enterprises, it falls under the 'Cohesion and values' heading of the 2021-2027 multiannual financial framework. Both Parliament and Council have agreed positions on the proposal, and trilogue negotiations started in autumn 2019 with a view to finding agreement before Council's first reading.

#### **EESC debate on rEUnaissance – A cultural vision for Europe**

The European Economic and Social Committee (EESC) hosted a debate on "rEUnaissance - A cultural vision for Europe", discussing the idea of reviving the European project. It was agreed that it is indeed necessary to have a Renaissance for Europe, and culture is the natural carrier and driver for strengthening the EU. During the discussion, EESC members linked culture to many issues such as our natural heritage, sustainability, the rights and dignity of minorities, peace, and social challenges, as well as to education, innovation, digitalisation and a place for artificial intelligence in our societies and daily lives. #### Brexit - Withdrawal agreement signed by the EU

Presidents Charles Michel and Ursula von der Leyen signed the withdrawal agreement in Brussels. Later on the same day, the document was signed by UK Prime Minister Boris Johnson in London. The European Parliament will hold a vote on the deal on 29 January. Once the Parliament has given its consent, the Council will adopt, by written procedure, the decision on the conclusion of the agreement on behalf of the EU. Once adopted, the withdrawal agreement will enter into force upon the UK's exit from the EU, on 31 January 2020 at midnight (Brussels time). More on Brexit and its timeline here.

### COUNCIL OF EUROPE

### Fourth annual gathering of the Faro Convention Network (FCN)

The Council of Europe celebrated the fourth Faro Convention Network (FCN) annual gathering, that took place on 3rd - 4th December 2019 in Venice, Italy. Organized with the support of the Venice Office of the Council of Europe, it gathered more than 20 representatives of different cultural heritage initiatives, projects and communities from diverse Council of Europe Member States.

This annual gathering provided a space for presenting diverse heritage initiatives and projects implemented in line with the Faro Convention Principles and was a place for fruitful exchanges among the participants, who were inspired by new ideas and proposals to advance the collaboration and create stronger synergies. With an aim to reinforce the cooperation among heritage communities within the Member States, the present European network could be strengthened by promoting the idea of establishing Faro Convention national networks, the official launch of an Italian specific network during a side-by-side meeting on the 2nd December serving as possible inspiration for other countries. ### 17th meeting of the Bureau of the Steering Committee for Culture, Heritage and Landscape (CDCPP)

The 17th meeting of the Bureau of the Steering Committee for Culture, Heritage and Landscape (CDCPP) took place in Paris (Council of Europe Office) on 25-26 November 2019.

Bureau members exchanged on the progress made in current CDCPP projects in the field of culture, heritage and landscape. They planed the next special thematic session for the CDCPP plenary in June

2020, following the success of this year's event on sustainable development and climate change.

Bureau members also fine-tuned the Council of Europe's forthcoming recommendation on cultural heritage and the challenges of preventing risks in day-to-day management: enhancing the attention of States, specialists and citizens, exchange on a forthcoming publication on Culture, Creativity and Artificial Intelligence and the follow-up to the Nicosia conference on promoting the Council of Europe's Convention on Offences related to Cultural Property (24-26 October 2019).

The next meeting of the Bureau of the Steering Committee for Culture, Heritage and Landscape (CDCPP) will be on 27-28 April 2020. The Steering Committee's next meeting will take place on 17-19 June 2020.

### Iceland becomes the 40th State Party to the European Landscape Convention of the Council of Europe

The Permanent Representation of Iceland transmitted to the Secretary General of the Council of Europe the instrument of ratification of the European Landscape Convention (ETS 176) on Wednesday 11 December 2019. ### **PACE Standing Committee meets in Strasbourg**

The Standing Committee of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe (PACE) met in Strasbourg on Friday 29 November 2019, on the occasion of the Georgian Chairmanship of the Committee of Ministers (November 2019–May 2020).

After the opening of the meeting by PACE President Liliane Maury Pasquier, the parliamentarians held an exchange of views with the Georgian Minister of Foreign Affairs, David Zalkaliani, who will chair the Council of Europe Committee of Ministers for the next six-months. The discussions focused on Georgia's priorities during its Chairmanship and other issues in the framework of the Assembly's ongoing political dialogue with the Committee of Ministers. Other items on the agenda include human rights and business, the reform of Interpol and extradition proceedings, the societal impact of the platform economy, the role of education in the digital era, and education in the new media environment. ### PROPOSALS FOR THE POST-2020 BUDGETS AND PROGRAMMES

### Multiannual Financial framework (MFF)

Negotiations on the EU's long-term budget took place in December 2019. The European Council underlined that the multiannual financial framework (MFF) for 2021-2017 will significantly contribute to climate action. The discussion on the EU's long-term budget followed the presentation of the MFF negotiating box with figures by Finland's presidency.

EU leaders called on the European Council President Charles Michel to take the negotiations forward with the aim of reaching a final agreement.

530 project proposals were submitted under the call for Support for European Cooperation Projects 2018. Set to last until 2020, Erasmus+ merges seven prior programmes and it has opportunities for a wide variety of individuals and organisations.

### New organisation registration system released for decentralised projects

The European Commission has released a <u>new platform for organisations with decentralised projects</u>.

The platform, which replaces the Participant Portal, allows Erasmus+ and European Solidarity Corps organisations to manage their information as well as search for other organisations.

Organisations that have already participated in an Erasmus+ or European Solidarity Corps project do not have to register again. You will have been assigned a new 'Organisation ID', which you can find by searching for your existing PIC using the Advanced Search function on the new platform.

### JPI ON CULTURAL HERITAGE AND GLOBAL CHANGE

The Joint Programming Initiative on Cultural Heritage and Global Change (JPI CH) supports the alignment of cultural heritage research in Europe in order to avoid fragmentation and to maximize the efficiency and added-value of national investments. In 2016 the JPI CH launched <u>a new 4-year (Horizon 2020) project</u> which supports further alignment and joint activities. During this 4-year phase JPI CH will launch four complementary calls, each with a specific thematic focus. Two calls were completed in 2017 and another one in 2019. There aren't any open calls now.

### HORIZON 2020

Horizon 2020 is the EU's main funding programme for research and innovation in Europe. It is a financial instrument implementing the Innovation Union, a Europe 2020 flagship initiative aimed at securing Europe's global competitiveness. The business and academic world are also challenged to come up with solutions and ideas to tackle societal issues that arise across Europe.

The Horizon 2020 programme is built around three pillars: Excellent Science, Industrial Leadership and Societal Challenges and some horizontal actions. Depending on your work area or research interest opportunities might be found under all pillars. #### Work Programmes 2018-2020

The European Commission has published its proposal for Horizon Europe, an ambitious €100 billion research and innovation programme that will succeed Horizon 2020.

The proposal was made as part of the EU's proposal for the next <u>EU long-term budget</u>, the multiannual financial framework (MFF). Various building blocks were taken into account including the interim evaluation of Horizon 2020, the Lab-Fab-App report (informally the Lamy report), foresight studies and various other reports.

### Results of the Horizon Europe implementation co-design exercise: towards a sound implementation framework

After a broad agreement on the <u>draft Orientations towards Horizon Europe Implementation strategy</u>, simplifications under Horizon 2020 are considered as a good basis for further simplification under Horizon Europe. However, there is scope for further improvements across the entire project lifecycle under the next EU research and innovation programme. During the Horizon Europe implementation strategy process, 2 major sets of co-design activities took place between July and October 2019. Firstly, an open web consultation on Horizon Europe co-design implementation that collected 1,549 replies between 31 July 2019 and 4 October 2019. Respondents appreciated the continuity approach taken by the Commission regarding the rules of participation and by extension in a wider sense, to Horizon Europe's implementation. Secondly, through meetings and exchanges at the European Research and Innovation Days (24-26 September 2019), which attracted a large stakeholder community of almost 4,000 participants. The feedback collected will feed into the ongoing work on the Horizon Europe Implementation Strategy.

#### Transition of the ERC to Horizon Europe - operational considerations

The ERC's mission and funding principles have been fully maintained by the European Union (EU) Parliament and Council during the negotiations on Horizon Europe, the successor programme to Horizon 2020. The ERC Scientific Council is satisfied with this fact, as it is in line with its <u>position paper</u> on that matter. Consequently, it is working to ensure a smooth transition of the ERC to Horizon Europe, which is expected to start in January 2021 and cover the period until the end of 2027.

### ERC Scientific Council's planning for the 2021-2022 calls for proposals:

As in previous transitions between consecutive EU research and innovation framework programmes, the calendar of the calls in the initial year of Horizon Europe may differ from the calendar of 2020 calls for proposals. All mono-beneficiary ERC calls (Starting, Consolidator, Advanced Grants, PoC) are expected to be launched in 2021 and 2022, but their opening and closing dates will be shifted so that the first calls will be launched only in January 2021. The Scientific Council expects the call schedule to be back to the usual opening and closing timeframes by mid-2022. The modified planning will likely not include a Synergy Grant call in the ERC Work Programme 2021. This call will probably be included again in the Work Programme 2022. The Scientific Council's intention is to launch this call in the summer of 2021 with a deadline in November of the same year. Find out more about this here.

#### EUROPEAN TERRITORICAL COOPERATION (INTERREG V)

<u>Interreg V 2014-2020 (European Territorial Cooperation)</u> is a framework for the implementation of joint actions and policy exchanges in Europe between national, regional and local actors from different member States. The framework is part of the Cohesion Policy and promotes innovation, a better environment and harmonious economic, social and territorial development of the Union as a whole. Interreg is built around three strands of cooperation: cross-border (Interreg A, 60 cooperation programmes), transnational (Interreg B, 15 cooperation programmes) and interregional (Interreg C, 4 cooperation programmes.). There are <u>11 thematic objectives</u> which guide the ERDF investments 2014-2020 of which Interreg is part. Conserving, protecting, promoting and developing natural and cultural heritage is one of the <u>investment priorities</u> (priority 6c).

### **Interreg Europe (former IVC)**

<u>Interreg Europe</u> helps regional and local governments across Europe to develop and deliver better policy. The programme facilitates exchange platforms and co-finances projects in which regional and local authorities (and other partners) can exchange good examples and ideas on public policy to improve the strategies for their citizens and communities. Specific objective 4.1 (see page 21-23 of <u>Programme Manual</u>) includes support to cultural heritage. Interreg Europe monitoring committee has conditionally approved 74 projects out of 170 applications received in the fourth call for project proposals. ### 90 Cultural Organisations in Europe urge EU leaders to increase the future budget of Creative Europe

On 22 November in a joint letter addressed to EU leaders from Europe's Cultural and Creative Sectors, 90 signatories collectively urged the European Council to support the European Parliament's proposal of increasing funding for Creative Europe to €2.8bn total. The letter supports the European Parliament's position to increase the budget for the Creative Europe Programme and underlines the importance of this increase, referring to the contribution of the cultural and creative sectors to the development of open and inclusive societies. Negotiations on the overall EU budget 2021-2027 (known as the Multi-Financial Framework or "MFF"), including the Creative Europe Programme, are ongoing between the European Parliament and the Council of Ministers. The letter was drafted by several organisations in different cultural and creative sectors (Culture Action Europe, FEP − Federation of European Publishers, FERA − Federation of European Film Directors, IMPALA − Independent music companies association, and UNIC − International Union of Cinemas).

### Europa Nostra protests against intentionally targeting cultural heritage as a weapon of war

Following the worrying escalation of tensions in the Middle East and remembering the disastrous destruction of the cultural heritage of humanity in the region caused by terrorist groups only a few years ago, Europa Nostra finds it unacceptable that the President of the United States should threaten to intentionally destroy cultural heritage sites in Iran as a weapon of war. As the European Voice of Civil Society committed to cultural heritage, they stood in solidarity with numerous heritage professionals and organisations in the US, Iran and worldwide who have expressed their deep concern about such objectionable threats. The deliberate targeting of cultural property in the event of armed conflict is prohibited by international law (\*) and has been recognised as a war crime by the International Criminal Court. The historic 2347 Resolution of the UN Security Council, adopted in March 2017, which "deplores and condemns the unlawful destruction of cultural heritage (...) in the context of armed conflicts". ### Europa Nostra with key heritage stakeholders release Paris Manifesto: Relançons l'Europe par la culture et le patrimoine culturel!'

Europa Nostra has released the PARIS MANIFESTO 'Relançons l'Europe par la culture et le patrimoine culturel !' with the endorsement and support of hundreds of key culture and cultural heritage stakeholders who attended the <u>European Cultural Heritage Summit</u> that took place on 27-30 October in Paris. The Paris Manifesto conveys a strong message on the strategic role of cultural heritage for tackling some of the most urgent challenges which Europe and its citizens are facing, as well as on its significant contribution for the future of Europe.

The draft text of the Paris Manifesto was presented at the European Policy Debate 'Cultural heritage at the heart of the revival of the European project' held on 30 October 2019 at the Collége des Bernardins as the concluding event of the European Cultural Heritage Summit 2019. The European Cultural Heritage Summit was organised by Europa Nostra under the high patronage of Emmanuel Macron, President of the French Republic, in cooperation and with the support of the European Commission and the French Government, as well as in partnership with the Fondation du Patrimoine. The Paris Summit brought together key representatives of the EU Institutions and Member States, international organisations and hundreds of representatives of the world of culture and cultural heritage, coming from all parts of Europe, including the distinguished laureates of the European Heritage Awards / Europa Nostra Awards run by Europa Nostra in partnership by the European Commission.

The Paris Manifesto encapsulates the key policy conclusions of the Paris Summit. By means of the Paris Manifesto, participants to the Paris Summit assert how much culture and cultural heritage represent Europe's DNA and therefore call upon European leaders to explicitly place culture and cultural heritage at the heart of the revival of the European project.

#### Climate Heritage Network Global Launch, Edinburgh

The <u>Climate Heritage Network</u> Global Launch took place during a two-day programme devoted to urgently mobilising the cultural heritage sector for climate action across the globe. The programme served as a key catalyst for accelerating the ambition of culture and heritage actors to help the communities they work in to deliver on the ambitions of the Paris Agreement.

A key outcome of the programme was the launch of the new Climate Heritage Network, a voluntary, mutual support network of local and city, state/provincial and regional, indigenous and tribal, and national arts, culture and heritage offices and agencies (working together with related NGOs, universities and other organisations) committed to aiding their jurisdictions in tackling climate change and achieving the ambitions of the <a href="Paris Agreement">Paris Agreement</a>.

### Five cities short-listed for European Capital of Culture 2025 in Germany

Chemnitz, Hannover, Hildesheim, Magdeburg, Nurnberg have been shortlisted in the competition to become European Capital of Culture 2025 in Germany. Once the relevant German authorities formally endorse the panel's recommendation, the shortlisted cities will have until the summer of 2020 to complete their applications. The panel will then meet again in Berlin in September 2020 to recommend the German city to become the European Capital of Culture 2025. In 2025, Germany will host the European Capital of Culture for the fourth time, after Berlin in 1988, Weimar in 1999 and Essen for the Ruhr in 2010. In the same year, there will also be a European Capital of Culture in Slovenia. The preselection round in Slovenia will take place in February 2020. Bad Ischl was also recently announced to be the European Capital of Culture 2024 in Austria. More information here and here.

### **European Heritage Makers visit Strasbourg**

The European Heritage Days celebrated the end of the second edition of European Heritage Makers Week with this year's storytellers, who travelled from across Europe to visit Strasbourg from 1st to 4th December 2019. The selected stories came from North Macedonia, Latvia, Russian Federation, Ukraine, Serbia and Georgia. The idea of European Heritage Makers originated in Finland in 2013 as a means of inspiring young heritage explorers to share their stories. It has since been expanded to a European level, and in 2018, as part of the European Year of Cultural Heritage, it became a regular part of the European Heritage Days calendar. Young storytellers from 13 countries shared their stories in 2019. They demonstrated great creative potential in designing stories that connect their local cultural heritage to the European narrative within the common theme of "Arts and Entertainment." Original stories featuring various well and lesser-known works of art, writers, public figures and cultural places presented local and European heritage in a new way, seen through the eyes of creative 12-18-year-old heritage makers. ### Transposing the Directive on Copyright in the Digital Single Market: A Guide for Libraries and Library Associations', published by EBLIDA, IFLA, LIBER and SPARC Europe

Organisations representing libraries across Europe have launched guidance on the transposition of the European Union's Directive on Copyright in the Digital Single Market in Member States. The goal is to provide essential background to libraries, library associations, researchers and others involved in national discussions about the new rules, the choices that will need to be made, and goals that libraries can adopt. The guidelines have been created jointly by EBLIDA, IFLA, LIBER and SPARC Europe, and cover 12 of the Articles in the Directive, looking at text and data mining, education, preservation, contracts and technological protection measures, out-of-commerce works, works of visual art in the public domain, press publishers rights and platform liability. **The guidelines are available from a secure page.** Access will be granted to librarians, library associations, academics and research organisations interested in working to promote an implementation of the Directive that delivers a

### ENCATC Congress 2019: How can cultural and creative spillovers help us understand sustainability within the arts, culture and creative industries?

Between 2 - 5 October 2019 in Dijon, cultural academics, researchers and managers from across the world met for ENCATC's Annual Congress, hosted by the Burgundy School of Business. It was an opportunity to present <u>Cultural and creative spillovers in Europe - a follow-up review</u>, an evidence review that was commissioned by the <u>European Partnership on Cultural and Creative Spillovers</u> in 2018. It was a moment to reflect on the report findings and the utility of the spillover framework within a discussion about the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). The sector has moved on from its early indignance over culture not being explicitly acknowledged in any of the 17 SDGs (perhaps a cause of its delayed sector embrace). Now, reassured by numerous <u>communications</u> and <u>high-level discussions</u>, it's broadly accepted that culture should be central in the <u>vision of the world that we want to see in 2030</u>. ### Europa Nostra supports the creation of a History teaching Observatory for Peace in Europe

Ahead of the meeting of Education Ministers of the State Parties to the <u>European Cultural Convention</u> organised in Paris on 26 November in the frame of the French Presidency of the Committee of Ministers of the Council of Europe, Europa Nostra expressed its full support for the creation of a History teaching Observatory for Peace in Europe (HOPE). This support was expressed in a letter addressed to the French Minister of Education Jean-Michel Blanquer and the French Secretary of State in charge of European Affairs Amélie de Montchalin. During the meeting, 23 countries have confirmed their <u>support</u> to this initiative, whose objective is to stimulate debate and sharing of best practices in teaching our common history and heritage. ### Europa Nostra appeals to preserve "in situ" the antiquities at the Venizelos Metro Station in Thessaloniki

On 16 December 2019, following the latest worrying developments regarding the invaluable antiquities that had been discovered at the Venizelos Metro Station in Thessaloniki, Greece, Europa Nostra made an appeal to the Central Archaeological Council (KA $\Sigma$ ) as well as to the Greek Government expressing its concern about the recently suggested plan against their in situ preservation. This appeal was made public prior to the meeting of the Central Archaeological Council held on 18 December.

The antiquities of the Venizelos Metro Station in Thessaloniki came into the international spotlight again due to a recent suggested revision of the initial plan to keep the antiquities in their original context. The proposed revision of the initial plan was due to be voted on Wednesday 18 December by the Members of the Central Archaeological Council (KA $\Sigma$ ). The new plan foresees the removal of the antiquities from their original setting, invoking financial criteria and arguments related to the further delay of the metro development project in case the initial plan of the "in situ" preservation of the antiquities is implemented.

### 14 European heritage sites shortlisted for the 7 Most Endangered programme 2020

The 7 Most Endangered programme, launched in January 2013, is a civil society campaign to save Europe's endangered heritage. While not providing direct funding, it raises awareness, prepares independent assessments, proposes feasible action plans to mobilise public and private support. Nominations were submitted by civil society or public bodies which form part of Europa Nostra's network of member and associate organisations from all over Europe. An <u>advisory panel</u>, composed of 15 international experts, selected the most endangered heritage sites on the basis of their historic and cultural value and the urgency of the threat they are facing. It also takes into account the community engagement, the commitment of public and private stakeholders, the long-term sustainability and the socio-economic potential of the site. #### Winners of the destination of Sustainable Cultural Tourism Awards 2019 announced

The 2019 edition of the Awards aimed to contribute towards the legacy of the European Year of Cultural Heritage 2018. The Awards contest was open to tourist destinations across Europe, to showcase their results and outputs in sustainable cultural tourism under seven categories. The winners were announced during the Award ceremony that took place in the Carmen de los Mártires Palace in Granada, Spain on 24 October. # Thirty-five new elements inscribed on the Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity

The Intergovernmental Committee for the Safeguarding of the Intangible Cultural Heritage meeting in the Colombian capital inscribed 35 elements on the Representative List of Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity. The new inscribed elements include 13 practices and traditions from Europe. The Representative List seeks to enhance visibility for the traditional practices and know-how of communities without recognizing standards of excellence or exclusivity. ### Court ruling converting Turkish museum to mosque could set precedent for Hagia Sophia

The Church of St Savior in Chora, which was converted into the Kariye Mosque in the early 16th century by an Ottoman vizier, was designated a museum by the Turkish government in 1945. Its 14th-century frescos and mosaics are regarded among the world's finest examples of Byzantine art. Turkey's Council of State, the country's top administrative court, ruled last month that the historic cabinet decision that made Kariye a museum was unlawful because a mosque "cannot be used except for its essential function". Now, President Recep Tayyip Erdogan is expected to implement the court's verdict or issue a new regulation to protect its status, according to Yeni Safak newspaper. The ruling has repercussions for other monuments from Turkey's Christian past, especially the Hagia Sophia, Christendom's greatest cathedral for a millennium before Constantinople's conquering Ottoman sultan, Mehmed II, claimed it as his imperial mosque in 1453. In 1934, the Turkish republic's secularising founder, Mustafa Ataturk, made Hagia Sophia a museum in a goodwill gesture towards the West. More information here.

#### 7,000-Year-Old Ritual Site Unearthed in Poland

A massive Stone Age monument that dates back almost 7,000 years and was probably used as a <u>ritual</u> and sacred site has been uncovered in Poland. This structure is almost three times the size of the circle of stones at Stonehenge. This find is providing archaeologists with a unique insight into a prehistoric society. It is believed that people worshiped divine forces there in a similar way that they did at Stonehenge. Specialists at Szczecin University carried out carbon dating on some items found at the enclosure and they established that the site dates back about 6,800 years ago. The structure measures some 360 feet (120 meters) in diameter and it consists of four circular trenches . According to Newsweek the enclosure "is over three times the size of the inner Sarsen Circle at Stonehenge and roughly the same size as the monument's outer ditch". More information here.

### Former Roman Empire frontier in bid as World Heritage Site

The Netherlands is to lead the way, in cooperation with the German states of North Rhine-Westphalia and Rhineland-Palatinate, in applying for the "Wet Limes" region to become a <u>UNESCO</u> World Heritage Site. The application is to be submitted to UNESCO in Paris on Thursday, January 9, 2020. A decision could be announced by July 2021. The Lower German Limes runs between Bad Breisig in the German state of Rhineland-Palatinate, through the state of North Rhine-Westfalia, to the seaside resort Katwijk in the Netherlands. The approximately 400-kilometer-long (ca. 250 miles) border area follows the course of the Rhine River and was a frontier during Roman times. More information <u>here</u>.

### Five Bulgarian monasteries to get a facelift with European funds

Five of the oldest Bulgarian monasteries, that have been declared monuments of culture - Bachkovski, Troyanski, Kremikovski, Kilifarevski and Plakovski, are expected to be renovated with European funds, the Ministry of Regional Development and Public Works announced. The goal is to make these religious centers even more attractive to pilgrims and tourists. The funds will be allocated under the Operational Programme "Regions in Growth" 2014-2020 which is managed by the Ministry. ### Biggest ever Roman shipwreck found in the eastern Mediterranean

Having languished at the bottom of the sea for around two millennia, the ship has now been rediscovered by archeologists, along with its cargo, and dated to between 100 BCE and 100 CE. It has already been judged to be the largest classical shipwreck found in the eastern Mediterranean. The wreck of the 110-foot (35-meter) ship, along with its cargo of 6,000 amphorae, was discovered at a depth of around 60m (197 feet) during a sonar-equipped survey of the seabed off the coast of Kefalonia -- one of the Ionian islands off the west coast of Greece. The survey was carried out by the Oceanus network of the University of Patras, using artificial intelligence image-processing techniques.
