# EU heads of state agreed on a recovery fund worth 750 billion euros to address the consequences of the coronavirus pandemic

The heads of state and government of the 27 EU member states agreed after several long days of negotiations in Brussels to a recovery fund worth a total of 750 billion euros, including 390 billion euros in grants and guarantees. The multiannual financial framework for the period 2021 to 2027 was also agreed.

The new Multiannual Financial Framework (MFF) will cover seven years between 2021 and 2027. The MFF, reinforced by Next Generation EU, will also be the main instrument for implementing the recovery package to tackle the socio-economic consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The size of the MFF -  $\mathbf{\mathfrak{C}1}$  **074.3 billion** - will allow the EU to fulfil its long-term objectives and preserve the full capacity of the recovery plan. This proposal is largely based on the proposal made by President Michel in February, which reflected two years of discussions between member states.

The MFF will cover the following spending areas:

- single market, innovation and digital
- cohesion, resilience and values
- natural resources and the environment
- migration and border management
- security and defence
- neighbourhood and the world
- European public administration

## **Recovery fund**

Next Generation EU will provide the Union with the necessary means to address the challenges posed by the COVID-19 pandemic. Under the agreement the Commission will be able to borrow up to €750 billion on the markets. These funds may be used for back-to-back loans and for expenditure channelled through the MFF programmes. Capital raised on the financial markets will be repaid by 2058.

- ReactEU
- Horizon Europe
- InvestEU

- Rural Development
- Just Transition Fund and
- RescEU.

### Long-term EU budget: MEPs slam cuts to culture and education

The Culture and Education Committee criticised the cuts to education and cultural programmes made by the Commission in its new proposal for the 2021-2027 budget.

In a debate on 13 July in the Culture and Education Committee with the Commission, all MEPs referred to cuts in the <u>revised MFF proposal</u> as "<u>unacceptable</u>" for EU culture and education, stressing that these sectors were particularly depleted by the COVID-19 crisis and need increased support to recover. While commending the "unprecedented level of financial support" in the EU Recovery plan, tabled alongside the revised MFF, they criticised the Commission for rowing back on its first MFF proposal in 2018.

Culture and Education Committee MEPs also pointed to the promise made by Commission President Ursula von der Leyen, ahead of her election, when she pledged to support the EP's request to triple Erasmus+ funding in the MFF 2021-2027. Compared to the Commission's initial MFF proposal (2018), the May 2020 revised proposal (when calculated in 2018 prices) presents a 20% cut to the European Solidarity Fund, a 13% cut to Creative Europe and a 7% cut to Erasmus+.

# Culture and audiovisual: the Council adopts conclusions on risk management in the area of cultural heritage, media literacy and the amendment of the Work Plan for Culture (2019 - 2022)

The Council of the European Union adopted on 26 May conclusions on risk management in the area of cultural heritage, recognising the importance of protecting cultural heritage against the various types of risks threatening it (natural hazards, climate change and man-made disasters), and also adds that crises such as the COVID-19 pandemic have a huge negative impact on the cultural and creative sectors. Member states are then invited to identify innovative tools and approaches for risk identification, prevention and mitigation. The conclusions also raise awareness that disaster prevention and preparedness require intervention and planning on multiple levels in order to be able to adequately respond to risks. The conclusions amending the Work Plan for Culture (2019-2022) reiterates that promoting sustainable development is a key action for the European Union's future in the Strategic Agenda 2019 - 2024 and amend the plan to give priority to culture as a driver of sustainable development.

#### Innovation Union Europe - Germany's commitment to the European Research Area

Federal Research Minister Anja Karliczek announced the national funding programme "Innovation Union Europe – Germany's commitment to the European Research Area" at the Informal Meeting of Research Ministers on 21 July. Its aim is to improve access to the European Research Area for German researchers and to deepen European cooperation in research and development. A total funding volume of 40 million euro – above and beyond its actual financial commitment to the European Research Area – will add to Germany's contribution to the ERA. # EU environment ministers call for recovery programme in line with environmental and climate policy goals

The Multiannual Financial Framework and the EU recovery programme should substantially contribute to the environment and climate goals of the EU. This is what the EU environment ministers are calling for today in an informal video conference as part of Germany's EU Council Presidency. Furthermore, in the joint call the ministers agreed to make the agreement on the upcoming key EU environmental and climate dossiers top priority in 2020. In the joint call, EU environment ministers urge that the lessons from the current crisis be used to support the resilient and sustainable development of economy and society. The European Green Deal provides the guiding framework necessary in these efforts. The EU environment ministers advocate that the EU Multiannual Financial Framework and EU recovery plan to be negotiated substantially contribute to the environment and climate goals of the EU. They point out that the climate and environmental crises have lost none of their urgency. Read more on this here.

# Public consultation on opportunities offered by digital technologies for the culture heritage sector

The European Commission is evaluating Recommendation of 27 October 2011 on the digitisation and online accessibility of cultural material and digital preservation to make sure it is still fit to respond to the needs and challenges of the cultural heritage sector in an era of rapid and continuous technological changes.

Moreover, the COVID-19 pandemic has led to the disruption of the sector's traditional way of working, making the digital transformation of cultural heritage institutions more relevant than ever. The Commission is seeking views on the importance of digitisation and digital transformation in the cultural heritage sector and ways of supporting such processes. The consultation aims at collecting the views of Member State competent authorities, national and regional cultural heritage institutions, international and umbrella organisations and networks, the Europeana ecosystem of organisations and professionals, technology stakeholders such as companies, SMEs/entrepreneurs, research organisations, academia and citizens. The online consultation for the evaluation of the Recommendation takes place between 22<sup>nd</sup> June 2020 and 14<sup>th</sup> September 2020. Find more about this here.

### COUNCIL OF EUROPE

#### 9th Plenary Session of CDCPP - 30 June

Reacting to the uncertain situation caused by the global pandemic, the CDCPP Bureau members decided to hold a one-day on-line CDCPP meeting on 30 June and a shortened plenary session on 12-13 November in Strasbourg. The idea is to keep the dynamics of the Committee going throughout the year, so that the various areas of work can move forward. At the June meeting, the CDCPP discussed a proposed Manifesto on Arts, Culture, Cultural Heritage and Freedom of Expression in the Digital Era, as well as a concept for a new Digital #exhibition – both being contributions to the 70th anniversary of the European Convention on Human Rights. These initiatives will highlight the sector's specific contribution to upholding Human Rights, Democracy and the Rule of Law. Other agenda items covered important issues in the cultural heritage and landscape sectors, including new promotional tools for the Faro Convention and Strategy 21. Find out more here.

# Reflection Group discussed the Congress Report "Culture without borders: Cultural heritage management for local and regional development"

Culture and Cultural Heritage Secretariat participated on 16th June in the Reflection Group organized by the Current Affairs Committee of the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities to discuss the Report "Culture without borders: Cultural heritage management for local and regional development", prepared by Ms. Maria Gravari-Barbas, that will serve as basis for a forthcoming Congress Recommendation on that subject. The discussion was enriched with the contributions by the Chair of the Steering Committee for Culture, Heritage and Landscape (CDCPP), experts and members of the Faro Convention Network, Culture and Cultural Heritage Secretariat, colleagues from the Enlarged Partial Agreement on Cultural Routes and Youth Delegates. The Culture and Cultural Heritage

Secretariat especially emphasized the importance of co-operation with the members of the Congress in the implementation of the Faro Convention on the Value of Cultural Heritage for Society at local and regional levels, always in close collaboration with the national governments. The interest of a bottom-up approach in managing cultural heritage was particularly emphasized, favoring participative governance models, where civil society can play an effective role in defining heritage policies.

After considering contributions from the Reflection Group, the Current Affairs Committee will discuss the final Report and the associated Recommendation on its meeting in September, in order to present them at a subsequent Congress Session for their adoption. # PROPOSALS FOR THE POST-2020 BUDGETS AND PROGRAMMES

#### Multiannual Financial framework (MFF)

EU leaders agreed a recovery package and the 2021-2027 budget that will help the EU to rebuild after the pandemic and will support investment in the green and digital transitions. The socio-economic fallout from the COVID-19 crisis requires a joint and innovative effort at EU level in order to support the recovery and resilience of the member states' economies. To achieve the desired result and be sustainable, the recovery effort should be linked to the traditional MFF, which has shaped EU budgetary policies since 1988 and offers a long-term perspective. EU leaders have agreed to a comprehensive package of  $\[mathbb{e}\]$ 1 824.3 billion which combines the multiannual financial framework (MFF) and an extraordinary recovery effort under the Next Generation EU (NGEU) instrument.

### Long-term EU budget

The new Multiannual Financial Framework (MFF) will cover seven years between 2021 and 2027. The MFF, reinforced by Next Generation EU, will also be the main instrument for implementing the recovery package to tackle the socio-economic consequences of the COVID-19 pandemic. The size of the MFF - €1 074.3 billion - will allow the EU to fulfill its long-term objectives and preserve the full capacity of the recovery plan. This proposal is largely based on the proposal made by President Michel in February, which reflected two years of discussions between member states.

The MFF will cover the following spending areas:

- · single market, innovation and digital
- cohesion, resilience and values
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- · migration and border management
- security and defence
- neighbourhood and the world
- European public administration

#### Loans and grants

€390 billion from the package will be distributed in the form of grants to member states and €360 billion in loans.

### Allocation from the Recovery and Resilience Facility (RRF)

The plan ensures the money goes to the countries and sectors most affected by the crisis: 70% under the grants of the Recovery and Resilience Facility will be committed in 2021 and 2022 and 30% will be committed in 2023.

Allocations from the RRF in 2021-2022 will be established according to the Commission's allocation criteria taking into account member states' respective living standards, size and unemployment levels. For 2023 allocations, the unemployment criterion will be replaced by the drop in GDP in 2020 and 2021.

#### **CREATIVE EUROPE**

Creative Europe is the European Commission's framework programme for support to the culture and audio-visual sectors. Following on from the previous Culture Programme and MEDIA programme, Creative Europe, with a budget of €1.46 billion, supports Europe's cultural and creative sectors.

#### Cooperation projects to assist the sectors most in need

With an overall sum of EUR 48,5 million, the 2020 Cooperation projects call is the most substantial part of the Creative Europe Culture sub-programme. The call was launched in November 2019 and the evaluation of has been speeded up to take account of the pandemic. A first substantial part of the budget will reach the sector via the pre-financing instalments very quickly. The projects can start in September 2020 and can last up to four years.

#### 40 new joint masters join the Erasmus Mundus catalogue

Erasmus+ has selected 40 new Erasmus Mundus joint master degree programmes that will offer scholarships to students from across the world. The first of four annual intakes of students will, starting in 2021. These newly-selected programmes will be added to the list of Erasmus Mundus Joint Master Degrees later during the summer 2020, making a total of around 120 available programmes.

Erasmus+ has invested over  $\leq$ 160 million in these new programmes, most of which money goes to pay for 6,490 scholarships for students from all over the world to attend these two-year master programmes. Find out more <a href="here.">here.</a>

### JPI ON CULTURAL HERITAGE AND GLOBAL CHANGE

The Joint Programming Initiative on Cultural Heritage and Global Change (JPI CH) supports the alignment of cultural heritage research in Europe in order to avoid fragmentation and to maximize the efficiency and added-value of national investments. In 2016 the JPI CH launched <u>a new 4-year (Horizon 2020) project</u> which supports further alignment and joint activities. During this 4-year phase JPI CH will launch four complementary calls, each with a specific thematic focus. Two calls were completed in 2017 and another one in 2019.

#### JPI CH Covid-19 Statement

The current COVID-19 pandemic is creating considerable disruption throughout the European research community, as universities have closed in many countries and research facilities and access to them are, at the best, reduced to a strict minimum. These disruptions are already greatly affecting the progress of many projects and will keep on doing so in the foreseeable future. Therefore, if requested and in strict compliance with national provisions, the JPI CH will support requests for an extension to a project already started, or for postponing the starting date of a *Conservation, Protection and Uses* project, presently fixed at six months maximum after the funding decision. # Cultural Heritage, Identities & Perspectives: Responding to Changing Societies: official launch

The JPI CH is pleased to announce a new funding opportunity for transnational proposals. Scholars are invited to submit <u>research proposals on the role of heritage in society from different (inter)national perspectives and value systems</u>. This includes questions such as what role heritage plays in the formation of identities, how institutions can manage heritage in an inclusive manner, and to what extent digitization contributes to meaningful access to heritage. The call aims to support interdisciplinary research that is set up and carried out by transnational consortia within the context of a single project. ### Conservation, Protection and Use Joint call: Results available

The JPICH Conservation, Protection and Use Joint Call is the fifth of a series of joint transnational calls within the context of the JPI Cultural Heritage. This call has the purpose of enabling the emergence of new research-based frameworks that incorporate knowledge, concepts and values to help manage the ongoing and interlaced changes that affect cultural heritage in relation to its physical and social environment. The JPICH Conservation, Protection and Use Joint Call for Proposals was formally published on 13th May 2019. At the deadline (11th September 2019) 62 eligible proposals were submitted. #### HORIZON 2020

Horizon 2020 is the EU's main funding programme for research and innovation in Europe. It is a financial instrument implementing the Innovation Union, a Europe 2020 flagship initiative aimed at securing Europe's global competitiveness. The business and academic world are also challenged to come up with solutions and ideas to tackle societal issues that arise across Europe.

The Horizon 2020 programme is built around three pillars: Excellent Science, Industrial Leadership and Societal Challenges and some horizontal actions. Depending on your work area or research interest opportunities might be found under all pillars. # Commission to invest €11 billion in new solutions for societal challenges and drive innovation-led sustainable growth

The European Commission announced the budget plan for the year 2020 for Horizon 2020. Over the next year, the Commission will seek greater impact of its research funding by focusing on fewer, but crucial, topics such as climate change, clean energy, plastics, cybersecurity and the digital economy. It will also be geared towards shaping the future research and innovation landscape by preparing the way for Horizon Europe, the next framework programme (2021-2027). An important novelty under Horizon Europe will be the European Innovation Council – a one-stop-shop for innovation funding to turn science into new business and accelerate the scale-up of companies. The European Innovation Council is already running in its pilot phase and will in 2020 benefit from a budget of €1.2 billion. Find out more here.

#### Transition of the ERC to Horizon Europe - operational considerations

The ERC's mission and funding principles have been fully maintained by the European Union (EU) Parliament and Council during the negotiations on Horizon Europe, the successor programme to Horizon 2020. The ERC Scientific Council is satisfied with this fact, as it is in line with its <u>position paper</u> on that matter. Consequently, it is working to ensure a smooth transition of the ERC to Horizon Europe, which is expected to start in January 2021 and cover the period until the end of 2027.

# ERC Scientific Council's planning for the 2021-2022 calls for proposals:

As in previous transitions between consecutive EU research and innovation framework programmes, the calendar of the calls in the initial year of Horizon Europe may differ from the calendar of 2020 calls for proposals. All mono-beneficiary ERC calls (Starting, Consolidator, Advanced Grants, PoC) are expected to be launched in 2021 and 2022, but their opening and closing dates will be shifted so that the first calls will be launched only in January 2021. The Scientific Council expects the call schedule to be back to the usual opening and closing timeframes by mid-2022. The modified planning will likely not include a Synergy Grant call in the ERC Work Programme 2021. This call will probably be included again in the Work Programme 2022. The Scientific Council's intention is to launch this call in the summer of 2021 with a deadline in November of the same year. Find out more about this here.

The framework is part of the Cohesion Policy and promotes innovation, a better environment and harmonious economic, social and territorial development of the Union as a whole. Interreg is built around three strands of cooperation: cross-border (Interreg A, 60 cooperation programmes), transnational (Interreg B, 15 cooperation programmes) and interregional (Interreg C, 4 cooperation programmes.). # European Heritage Alliance Manifesto conveyed to EU Leaders ahead of next European Council meeting in Brussels

At the very start of the German Presidency of the European Union and ahead of the important physical meeting of the European Council on 17-18 July 2020 in Brussels, Europa Nostra sent, on behalf of the 49 members of the European Heritage Alliance, individual letters to all 27 EU leaders urging them to seize the challenge of Europe's unprecedented recovery plans to unleash the transformative power of cultural heritage for the future of Europe. The letters were accompanied by the European Heritage Alliance Manifesto 'Cultural Heritage: a powerful catalyst for the Future of Europe'. This important Manifesto was launched by the Alliance members on 9 May, on the occasion of the 2020 Europe Day, which this year marked the 70th anniversary of the Schuman Declaration which initiated the process of European integration. The Manifesto highlights seven interconnected ways in which cultural heritage can act as a catalyst for positive change in Europe. Further details here.

Europa Nostra announced last April a new <u>collaboration</u> with <u>ICOMOS</u> (the International Council on Monuments and Sites) on the topic of cultural heritage and climate change. The project aims at producing a <u>European Heritage Green Paper</u>, a policy and advocacy document to stimulate a wide mobilisation of the heritage community to contribute to the success of the <u>European Green Deal</u> (EGD) and to understand the role and potential of cultural heritage in achieving the ambitions of the EGD. The project, led by the expert and activist on climate change Andrew Potts, who is the Coordinator of the Climate Change and Heritage Working Group (CCHWG) and a leading member of the <u>Climate Heritage Network</u>, is developed in cooperation with the Europa Nostra Board and Secretariat, and with the invaluable support of the European Investment Bank Institute. The European Heritage Green Paper is planned to be issued in September. It will be widely disseminated to the EU Institutions and other stakeholders concerned with the European Green Deal. # 2020 European Heritage Awards Winners announced

Ahead of the celebration of this year's Europe Day (9 May), the European Commission and Europa Nostra are proud to announce the 2020 winners of the European Heritage Awards / Europa Nostra Awards. Europe's top honour in the heritage field goes to 21 exemplary achievements from 15 European countries. This year's impressive collection of award winners range from the restoration of Rubens' garden pavilion in Antwerp (Belgium), to the revival of the renaissance arsenal on the island of Hvar (Croatia); from the trans-European network "Tramontana" dedicated to the research of the tangible and intangible heritage of mountainous regions, to the sensitive preservation of a cultural landscape formed

by subterranean caves and wineries in the province of Burgos (Spain); from the rebirth of the impressive Basilica di Santa Maria di Collemaggio in l'Aquila (Italy), heavily damaged by the devastating earthquake of 2009, to the "Ambulance for Monuments" with an emergency team of craftspeople ready to save endangered heritage in Romania; and from "Scanning for Syria", a research project carried out by a research centre in The Netherlands, to a major exhibition marking the 75th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz, organised in co-production between Poland and Spain.

Heritage lovers and supporters from Europe and all around the world can <u>vote online</u> for their favourite award winners and decide which achievement will win this year's *Public Choice Award*. The Public Choice Award will be announced in the autumn of 2020. The winners of the Grand Prix, entitled to receive a monetary award of  $\le 10,000$  each, will also be made public on this occasion. ICOMOS and partners in the Culture 2030 Goal campaign have released, on 20 April 2020, a Statement on Culture and the COVID-19 pandemic. Signed by eight international cultural networks, the statement is framed in our commitment to the 2030 Agenda and the need to guarantee culture is at the heart of the UN Decade of Action for the SDGs. # Findings on the consultation on the impact of COVID-19 on the heritage world to be released in September

Europa Nostra launched on 26 March a <u>consultation</u> on this topic among its large pan-European network of members and partners. Europa Nostra is currently preparing a more extensive paper summarizing and analyzing the main findings of this important consultation. Such paper will be published after the summer and will be widely disseminated among heritage actors and policy-makers at all levels of governance. This paper will underpin Europa Nostra's advocacy action, conducted jointly with our members and partners, to ensure that cultural heritage is duly included in the EU's immediate response to the COVID-19 crisis as well as in the "Next Generation EU" recovery plans. Indeed, Europa Nostra and our members and partners are fully convinced of the immense potential of culture and cultural heritage for <u>Europe's socioeconomic recovery in the aftermath of the pandemic</u>. ### More focus and coordination needed in EU spending for cultural sites, say Auditors

Several European initiatives have been developed to promote cultural sites. But their coordination with funding arrangements is too limited and EU investments lack focus on the preservation and financial sustainability of cultural sites, according to a <a href="new report from the European Court of Auditors">new report from the European Court of Auditors</a>. In addition, cultural investments are not treated as a priority, but mainly as means of promoting economic objectives, say the auditors. The EU can be proud of its rich cultural diversity and has put in place a number of initiatives to ensure that Europe's cultural heritage is safeguarded and enhanced. Various EU funds may contribute to this end: the most significant one is the European Regional Development Fund (ERDF). The auditors looked at the effects of such investments and assessed the financial and physical sustainability of a number of sites which had received aid. They reviewed 27 projects in seven Member States: Germany, France, Croatia, Italy, Poland, Portugal and Romania. Find out more about the report here.

# Hagia Sophia: UNESCO deeply regrets the decision of the Turkish authorities, made without prior discussion, and calls for the universal value of World Heritage to be preserved

The Director-General of UNESCO deeply regrets the decision of the Turkish authorities, made without prior discussion, to change the status of Hagia Sophia. This evening, she shared her serious concerns with the Ambassador of Turkey to UNESCO. Hagia Sophia is part of the Historic Areas of Istanbul, a property inscribed on UNESCO's World Heritage List. "Hagia Sophia is an architectural masterpiece and a unique testimony to interactions between Europe and Asia over the centuries. Its status as a museum reflects the universal nature of its heritage, and makes it a powerful symbol for dialogue," said Director-General Audrey Azoulay. This decision announced today raises the issue of the impact of this change of status on the property's universal value. States have an obligation to ensure that modifications do not affect the Outstanding Universal Value of inscribed sites on their territories. UNESCO must be given prior notice of any such modifications, which, if necessary, are then examined by the World Heritage Committee. Further details <a href="here">here</a>.

#### 'Consensus' that Notre-Dame spire should be rebuilt in original form

French President Emmanuel Macron said Thursday that he agrees the spire of Notre-Dame Cathedral, which was destroyed in last year's devastating fire, should be rebuilt exactly as it was.

France's incoming culture minister said earlier that there was a "large consensus" that the spire of Notre-Dame cathedral in Paris should be rebuilt as it was before. Macron had previously spoken in favour of adding a contemporary "touch" to the 13th-century monument. He vowed to rebuild Notre-Dame in less than five years after a major fire on April 15 largely destroyed the 850-year-old Gothic cathedral's roof and spire. His pledge prompted concern among architects, conservationists and academics from around the world, who have called for caution in restoring the badly damaged edifice. Find out more here.

The Call for European Stories was launched as an activity of the <u>European Year of Cultural Heritage 2018</u>, the successes of which it now aims to build on, and supporting the <u>European Framework for Action on Cultural Heritage</u>, adopted in December 2018 to secure the long term impact of the European Year of Cultural Heritage. #### The newly transformed Archaeology Data Service (ADS) Library

In March 2020, a project to redevelop the ADS Library was completed. The Library brings together bibliographic records and Open Access copies of published and unpublished documents relating to archaeology and heritage. It holds over 100,000 open access documents including unpublished fieldwork reports – the so-called 'grey literature' – as well as e-prints of journals and monographs; since 2015 there have been 680,372 downloads. The redevelopment has focussed on enhancing accessibility and creating a more intuitive framework for enabling resource discovery. Digital Object Identifiers (DOIs) have been create for most of the Journal articles within the Library, and in general given a more prominent role in a push towards encouraging better citation practices. The Heritage Alliance launched the National Lottery Heritage Funded Heritage Digital project alongside skills specialists Media Trust, Charity Digital and Naomi Korn Associates. Until the end of July 2021, free digital skills training will be available as part of this partnership project, based around the themes of digital communications, digital marketing strategy, digital rights and digital technology. # **Website launches European archaeology resource**

Some of Europe's most important archaeological sites will be available online shortly. Information for professional and leisure use is to be brought together on one site by academics at the University of York. The Archaeology Data Service (ADS) based at the University, has been awarded 608,000 Euro by the European Union's Culture 2000 programme to develop a system of conserving, spreading and retrieving information. Under the ARENA project (Archaeological Records of Europe: Networked Access) key archives will be made available on the internet via a European portal. The ARENA project will allow people to search for information about archaeological sites in six European countries - Poland, Romania, Denmark, Iceland, Norway, and the United Kingdom. #### New virtual museum lets visitors explore Malta's underwater archaeology

The general public can now access 10 underwater archaeological sites in the comfort of their own homes. 'The Virtual Museum- Underwater Malta' website is an online museum which ranges from old archaeological findings to sunken aircrafts and submarines. Launching the underwater museum at Fort St Elmo, Professor Tim Gambin from the University of Malta explained that through means of virtual reality, one can be able to experience the underwater world, which is usually explored only by divers. He said that the concept of the museum highlights the importance of Malta's heritage found underwater. Find out more here.

### Three cities short-listed for European Capital of Culture 2026 in Finland

A panel of twelve independent experts recommended the shortlist from competing Finnish cities at the outcome of a 2-day (partially digital) meeting in Helsinki. In 2026, Finland will host the European Capital of Culture for the third time, after Helsinki in 2000 and Turku in 2011. Finland invited applications from interested cities in April 2019. Three cities submitted applications by the deadline of 5 May 2020: Oulu, Savonlinna and Tampere. Being shortlisted for the European Capital of Culture title can result in significant cultural, economic and social benefits for the cities concerned, if their bid is part of a longer-term culture-led development strategy. #### Digitalisation: an alternative to culture?

Following the stories on how COVID-19 has affected Matera, Rijeka and Timisoara at the Interreg Europe's Seminar "Continuing, restarting and adjusting amidst COVID-19", the audiences raised the question of "Is digitalisation the solution for all cultural expressions?" "People are tired of being online" said Vania Cauzillo, representing Matera 2019 Project Leaders Committee. "Kids are stressed with digital school, and the elderly cannot access such tool." Maintaining the desire of culture, therefore, is even more vital in a COVID-induced online world. Nevertheless, when they talked about theatre as a method to be human, and to connect humans, digital tools are of great help. Two-thirds of Matera 2019 budget was spent on their community co-creation process, which actively involves the audiences in theatre productions. The pressure to go digital is also visible for Rijeka 2020. The possibility of organising large-scale, international ensembles and productions is still uncertain. To maintain a physically safe distance between attendees, theatres can only house a-third of their capacity, which offers no realistic financial frame to make such events feasible. As social measures are lightened, art and culture flows in Rijeka's veins again. Rijeka 2020 summer programme has recently been announced, with around 120 events in Rijeka and its nearby regions in July and August. The programme incorporates a wide spectrum of arts, including music festivals and weekend concerts, drama and dance performances and stand-up shows, as well as ensembles of classical music, choirs, opera, orchestra, and exhibitions.

#### Pandemic resilience as a criterion for ECoC 2026

On 24th June, the panel for the European Capital of Culture (ECoC) 2026 announced the cities to proceed to the second and final bidding round - Tampere Region 2026 (Tampere), Oulu2026 (Oulu), and Saimaa-ilmiö 2026 (Saimaa Phenomenon 2026). Pandemic resilience will be a benchmark of not just the ECoC 2026 final round, but also of the EU's Cohesion Policy 2021-2027. The new Cohesion Policy will transition from 11 former thematic objectives to 5 policy objectives, envisioning a Europe of innovativeness, carbon-free, connectivity, social development and equality, and closer to citizen. The qualities of adaptability and resilience – the enablers of quick and adequate responses to pandemics, also often mentioned in the efforts against the adverse impacts of climate change, are highly relevant to cohesion and need to be embedded in all of the objectives. It is even more crucial to the overall mission of Cohesion Policy now than ever, as COVID-19 is expected to and is already increasing economic and employment disparities between EU's more and less advanced regions.
