### **EUROPEAN UNION**

### EU Budget 2019: MEPs increase funding on youth, migration and research

On 29-30 September 2018 the <u>European Parliament approved a budget totalling €166.3 billion in commitments</u>, which is €721 million more than the original European Commission proposal. MEPs increased the Erasmus+ programme by €362 million and fully restored the pre-EFSI budgets of the Connecting Europe Facility (CEF), which funds infrastructure projects, and the Horizon 2020 programme, which backs research projects, adding €256.9 million. Both programmes had faced cuts as part of measures to help finance the EU guarantee for the European Fund for Strategic Investments (EFSI). They further increased Horizon 2020 by another €65 million and climate-related spending under Horizon 2020, CEF and <u>Heading 2</u> programmes by another €97.3 million. The whole Parliament will vote on its position on the Draft Budget 2019 on 24 October. This will kick off three weeks of "conciliation" talks with the Council, with the aim of reaching a deal between the two institutions in time for next year's budget, to be voted on by Parliament and signed by its President at the end of November.

#### **EU Copyright Directive**

The <u>European Parliament has agreed</u> on the <u>Copyright in the Digital Single Market Directive</u>. This key vote was held on the 12 September, after a summer break and strong lobbying from all sides. The Parliament decided to support the rapporteur's proposal on many fronts, for instance on the very controversial Article 13 which mandates that internet society service providers will need to filter and acquire licenses over the content uploaded by their users. Article 11, creating a new press publishers' rights, was also adopted. This vote gives the Parliament a negotiating stance with the Council and the Commission. This will be the next step in the copyright reform, where representatives of the three institution will meet in the so-called trilogues to agree on a final version of the text, which is expected to be finalised in January 2019. <u>EBLIDA</u>, <u>IFLA</u>, <u>LIBER</u>, <u>Sparc Europe</u> and <u>EUA</u> (European University Association) sent a common position to those involved in trilogues comparing the three texts. The briefings include a comparison view among the three texts that are on the table, and a final preferred option for the library and cultural heritage sector. ### Commission report on the evaluation of Europeana

The European Commission issued a report to the European Parliament and the Council on the evaluation of Europeana and the way forward. It outlines the results of the independent evaluation of Europeana as a European cultural and digital innovation project as well as the Commission's vision on the way forward for the future development of the project. In its Communication published on 22 May 2018, the Commission announced next steps for Europeana aiming to take it forward as a pan-European enabler of the digital transformation of cultural heritage and a key initiative on democratic access to culture. Together with other announced initiatives such as the network of competence centres to safeguard knowledge about endangered heritage monuments through large-scale digitisation, the upcoming creation of an online directory of European films and the pan-European

network of Digital Creative and Innovation Hubs, Europeana will contribute to the further promotion, diffusion and accessibility of European culture and cultural heritage. More information about the report is available <a href="here">here</a>.

#### Public hearing on the New European Agenda for Culture

The European Parliament's CULT Committee held a public hearing on the New European Agenda for Culture. The purpose of the public hearing was to contribute to the drafting an own-initiative report in reaction to the Commission Communication published in May 2018. The experts invited by the Committee focused in their presentations on the following subjects: "A plea for matching ambitions with appropriate means" by Ugo Bacchella, Fondazione Fitzcarraldo; "Stronger together in a globalizing world. Options for culture action in Europe" by Christine Merkel, Unesco Germany; and "The new agenda for culture: a civil society perspective" by Rosa Perez Monclus, Culture Action Europe. ### **COUNCIL OF EUROPE**

### 8th Annual Advisory Forum on Cultural Routes (Görlitz, Germany)

The theme of the 2018 Annual Advisory Forum on Cultural Routes of the Council of Europe was "Cultural Routes of the Council of Europe connecting cultural values, heritage sites and citizens: strategies and synergies in a global perspective". The 8th Annual Advisory Forum was organised under the auspices of the Enlarged Partial Agreement on Cultural Routes in co-operation with the City of Görlitz, the Saxon Ministry of the Interior and the German Federal Foreign Office and with the support of the European Institute on Cultural Routes in Luxembourg. The Forum highlighted the strategies and synergies between the Cultural Routes of the Council of Europe and International Organisations (European Union, UNESCO, ICOMOS, Organisation of Ibero-American States, NECSTouR) concerned with the protection and the promotion of cultural heritage. Coinciding with the current European Year of Cultural Heritage, the Forum explored concrete possibilities of co-operation with the other European programmes or Conventions, such as the European Heritage Days and the UNESCO World Heritage List. It was also an occasion to discuss developing new initiatives and partnerships, as well as a platform for exchange of good practices.

### **European Heritage Days Assembly**

This year's <u>European Heritage Days Assembly</u> took place on 17-19 October at the Palais de l'Europe in Strasbourg, France, where <u>European Heritage Days</u> representatives and guests met to share their experiences, presented local success stories, and planned for the year ahead. This year's edition of the festival has seen a lot of innovative efforts in presenting shared European heritage. The National Coordinators explored new approaches to event organisation and community engagement to celebrate the common theme The Art of Sharing. The central ideas behind the theme are tightly related the Council of Europe's and European Commission's mission to raise awareness of Europe's cultural and historic treasures.

### Funding and investments

### PROPOSALS FOR THE POST-2020 BUDGETS AND PROGRAMMES

The European Council invited the European Parliament and the Council to examine the European Commission's proposals on the <u>next EU long-term budget</u>, the multiannual financial framework (MFF). The Council held a policy debate on the multiannual financial framework (MFF) for 2021 to 2027 on 18 September. The three institutions hope to reach an agreement before the European elections in May 2019.

### Proposal for the next research and innovation framework programme

The Commission has published its proposal for Horizon Europe, an ambitious €100 billion research and innovation programme that will succeed Horizon 2020. The proposal was made as part of the EU's proposal for the next EU long-term budget, the multiannual financial framework (MFF). Various building blocks were taken into account including the interim evaluation of Horizon 2020, the Lab-Fab-App report (informally the Lamy report), foresight studies and various other reports. ### Proposal for the next Creative Europe programme

Having considered the possibility of merging the <u>Creative Europe programme</u> with other programmes supporting European values, rights and justice, the European Commission has decided to continue the Creative Europe programme as a stand-alone programme and increase its budget by 17 %. The only programme focusing exclusively on cultural and creative activities and enterprises, it falls under the 'Cohesion and values' heading of the 2021-2027 multiannual financial framework.

#### **CREATIVE EUROPE**

The Creative Europe programme aims to support culture and audiovisual sectors in Europe and encourages players to operate across Europe, to reach new audiences and to seize the opportunities of the digital age and globalisation.

530 project proposals have been submitted under the call for Support for European Cooperation Projects 2018. The European Commission received applications from nearly all the countries participating in the Creative Europe programme. ### **EUROPE FOR CITIZENS**

The Europe for Citizens programme aims to strengthen remembrance and to enhance civic participation at EU level. Under the strand 'European remembrance' the programme promotes debate,

reflection and cooperation in the field of European integration and remembrance. The 'Democratic engagement and civic participation' strand supports projects aimed at enhancing democratic participation, solidarity and involvement at EU level. These are the priorities for 2018-2020. Currently, there aren't any open calls. The <u>deadlines for submission of applications for 2019-2020</u> have been updated. #### **ERASMUS+**

Erasmus+ is the EU's programme to support education, training, youth and sport in Europe. The 2018 <u>call for proposals</u> supports several kinds of actions in education and training such as sector skills alliances and strategic partnerships. On 30 May, the Commission adopted its proposal for the next Erasmus programme, with a doubling of the budget to 30 billion euros for the period 2021-2027. #### JPI ON CULTURAL HERITAGE AND GLOBAL CHANGE

The Joint Programming Initiative on Cultural Heritage and Global Change (JPI CH) supports the alignment of cultural heritage research in Europe in order to avoid fragmentation and to maximize the efficiency and added-value of national investments. In 2016 the JPI CH launched a new 4-year (Horizon 2020) project which will support further alignment and joint activities. During this 4-year phase JPI CH will launch four complementary calls, each with a specific thematic focus. Two calls were completed in 2017. The results of the call on Heritage in Changing Environments will be announced soon. A third call on identity and perception will probably open later this year. The JPI CH and the Cultural Heritage Agency of the Netherlands organised an international conference on the best practices of participatory governance of built heritage on 4 October 2018 in Amersfoort, the Netherlands.

The ten JPIs have signed a joint declaration, "<u>Driving research and innovation to address global challenges</u>", that summarises the JPIs' views and ambitions for their future development and impact. The declaration was presented at the conference <u>10 Years Joint Programming - Achievements and the Way Forward</u>, that took place in Vienna on September 20th.

### **HORIZON 2020**

Horizon 2020 is the EU's main funding programme for research and innovation in Europe. It is a financial instrument implementing the Innovation Union, a Europe 2020 flagship initiative aimed at securing Europe's global competitiveness. The business and academic world are also challenged to come up with solutions and ideas to tackle societal issues that arise across Europe.

The Horizon 2020 programme is built around three pillars: Excellent Science, Industrial Leadership and Societal Challenges and some horizontal actions. Depending on your work area or research interest opportunities might be found under all pillars. Detailed information on calls can be found in the multiannual Work Programmes (see <u>WPs under sections</u>).

#### Work Programmes 2018-2020

The European Commission has published an updated 2018-2020 Horizon 2020 Work Programme. This update provides some alterations and additional details for the 2019 calls in the 2018-2020 Work Programme initially published in October 2017. The degree of changes varies across the Work Programme parts and while new topics have been added to some calls for proposals (e.g. in Societal Challenge 1), other parts will only see minor corrections and additional information provided (e.g. the European Innovation Council Pilot). The parts of the Work Programme that relate to 2020 are still indicative and will be finalised during 2019. To help future applicants identify the changes easily, the Commission also published the official lists of changes made to each Work Programme part. #### H2020 underwrite guarantee update

The UK government has updated its information for UK applicants to Horizon 2020. A <u>technical notice</u> published on 23 August 2018 provides more detail on the H2020 underwrite guarantee, the recent extension to the guarantee and how the government plans to continue to support research and innovation in the UK. It is aimed at all UK organisations who are in receipt of H2020 funding or who are bidding for such funding. It will also be of interest to partner organisations who work with UK participants on Horizon 2020 projects.

The UK and EU's intention is that the eligibility of UK researchers and businesses to participate in H2020 will remain unchanged for the remaining duration of the programme. This is set out in the Financial Provisions of the draft Withdrawal Agreement, which has been agreed by both UK and Commission negotiators and welcomed by the other 27 EU countries at March European Council. However, the government states that as a responsible government it needs to plan for every eventuality to ensure that cross-border collaboration in science and innovation can continue after EU exit.

### EUROPEAN TERRITORICAL COOPERATION (INTERREG V)

<u>Interreg V 2014-2020 (European Territorial Cooperation)</u> is a framework for the implementation of joint actions and policy exchanges in Europe between national, regional and local actors from different member States. The framework is part of the Cohesion Policy and promotes innovation, a better environment and harmonious economic, social and territorial development of the Union as a whole. Interreg is built around three strands of cooperation: cross-border (Interreg A, 60 cooperation programmes), transnational (Interreg B, 15 cooperation programmes) and interregional (Interreg C, 4 cooperation programmes.). There are <u>11 thematic objectives</u> which guide the ERDF investments 2014-2020 of which Interreg is part. Conserving, protecting, promoting and developing natural and cultural heritage is one of the investment priorities (priority 6c).

#### **Interreg Europe (former IVC)**

<u>Interreg Europe</u> helps regional and local governments across Europe to develop and deliver better policy. The programme facilitates exchange platforms and co-finances projects in which regional and local authorities (and other partners) can exchange good examples and ideas on public policy to improve the strategies for their citizens and communities. Specific objective 4.1 (see page 21-23 of <u>Programme Manual</u>) includes support to cultural heritage. The <u>fourth call for project proposals</u> closed on 22 June 2018. A Monitoring Committee will take a decision on the approval of applicants in March 2019.

#### **URBACT**

<u>URBACT</u> supports networks for cities to facilitate the exchange of good practices in the design and implementation of sustainable integrated urban policies. The programme supports three types of networks. Cultural heritage is one of the urban topics under URBACT. #### European Strategy Forum on Research Infrastructures 2018 roadmap launched

The European Strategy Forum on Research Infrastructures (ESFRI) presented the ESFRI Roadmap 2018 on Large Scale Research Infrastructures at its conference in Vienna last week. The Roadmap 2018 includes a total of 18 ESFRI projects, with six new pan-European research infrastructure projects, presented at the conference hosted by the Austrian EU Council Presidency. The new projects

announced are focusing on several areas, including social and cultural innovation. Under H2020, €214 million will be made available through competitive calls in 2018-2019 but infrastructures are of such magnitude and scope that countries need to pool their resources to build them. Once implemented, the infrastructures in the ESFRI Roadmap will provide open access to resources and services for all scientists across Europe. The new Roadmap also identified two areas with high potential for the development of new research infrastructures: religious studies and transition to open science. # ESPON 2020 - HERITAGE - The Material Cultural Heritage as a Strategic Territorial Development Resource: Mapping Impacts Through a Set of Common European Socioeconomic Indicators

### STEPS project showcased pilot results in Croatia

STEPS is a joint project of the European Commission and the Council of Europe, and is part of the European Year of Cultural Heritage initiative 'Heritage for all: citizen participation and social innovation'. It aims to achieve social cohesion, mutual understanding and trust, by means of participatory heritage engagement. ### ATHENA. Remote Sensing Science Centre for Cultural Heritage

The Cyprus University of Technology is pursuing excellence in the field of remote sensing through an EU-funded three-year project named ATHENA, which was launched in December 2015 to support this drive. Now "ATHENA" wants to establish a Centre of Excellence in the field of Remote Sensing for Cultural Heritage through the development of an enhanced knowledge base and innovative methods. The Centre is being set up by the university's Remote Sensing and Geo-environment Research Laboratory. The project is being carried out with the help of experts from the German Aerospace Centre and Italy's National Research Council. The close collaboration between CUT and other experts in the field of Remote Sensing for Cultural Heritage in the EU will form a synergic network that will permit the transfer of knowledge and training of the existing personnel of CUT. It is noteworthy to underline the importance of the geographical position of the Centre in the region of eastern Mediterranean, a region inhabited thousands of years before and therefore abound in archaeological residues.
